We are thrilled to be able to keep so many of our older and special needs vulnerable dogs inside this spacious, climate-controlled building. We have created our own dog park, complete with yards and holding areas where dogs can run and play either in small groups or, for those that cannot socialize with others, their own secure area.

A great big thank you to William Philip for making this possible.

Bruno was one of our favorite beloved dogs whose life was cut short by cancer. He recently died after surgery to remove a fast-growing tumor. The new barn is dedicated to his memory.

A Moo-ving Tale!

Moving a 1000-pound cow isn't easy, especially when that cow is missing a leg and refuses to use her prosthesis! Lily Rose, our special young cow who is missing a portion of one of her back legs, had settled in a spot without shelter, and despite our best efforts to coax and lure her with treats to her enclosure, she remained decidedly stationary. With the cold weather approaching, we needed to find a solution.

We consulted a man who works at the local stockyard, and he advised us to use the hay hooks on a skid steer, stating, "We do it all the time." But let's face it, most people moving "downer" cows at the cattle auctions are not concerned about the well-being of those animals; they're just trying to expedite things. There are many documented cases of workers laughing as they drag a poor, doomed cow, unable to get up, to her final destination with a chain or brutally lift and drop her with a tractor.

So, we purchased the "Easy Cow Lifter" sling, and volunteer Brandon King brought out his backhoe, while a group of us assembled to make it happen. The Easy Cow Lifter was anything but, but finally, after a modification or two and a lot of trepidation, we got her moved into her warm and cozy pen under the barn overhang.

Nobody was hurt, despite the use of heavy equipment, a cow that didn't want to be moved, and a volunteer, Ben Hutchings, being sent flying about six feet after being hip-checked by Lily!

All's well that ends well—our sweet Lily Rose is happy and protected in her new spot. Teamwork makes the dream work!

He and his siblings were brought to us after they were found in a ditch near the bodies of their mother and another puppy who had been hit by a car. They were dirty, hungry, and scared, but it didn't take long for them to become happy, playful little puppies.

All of his siblings have been adopted, but Cedric has severe hip dysplasia and will need a total hip replacement. A specialist must perform the procedure, and it's not cheap—on average, the procedure costs about \$15,000.
